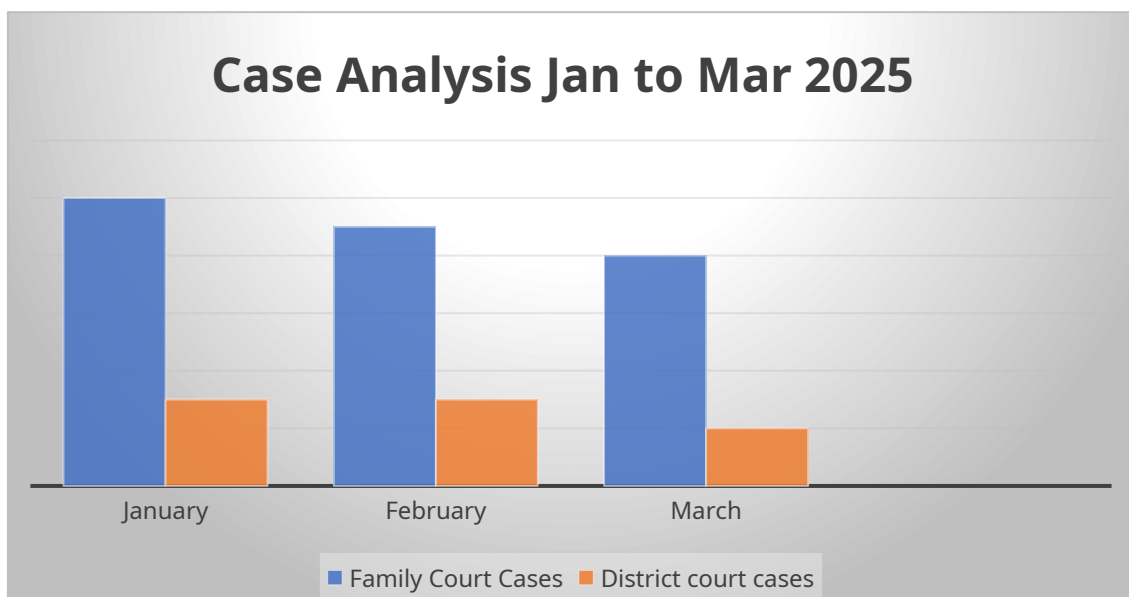
With all these efforts, I would like to kindly acknowledge the helping hands of the volunteers, along with the support from local and overseas partners of SVSG in achieving our goals.


Summary of our Case Analysis from January to March 2025.

From January to March, SVSG has observed an increase in family court cases, influenced by several contributing factors. District court cases follow closely as the second highest category of family-related issues, indicating a rising trend in cases concerning family relationships. The chart below illustrates the trends in these cases over the three-month period.



Family court cases are the most prevalent issue in SVSG case management records for the months of January to March, which identify several contributing factors:

Alcohol Problems	Many women report that their husbands have alcohol-related issues. These habits negatively affect the amount of time husbands spend with their
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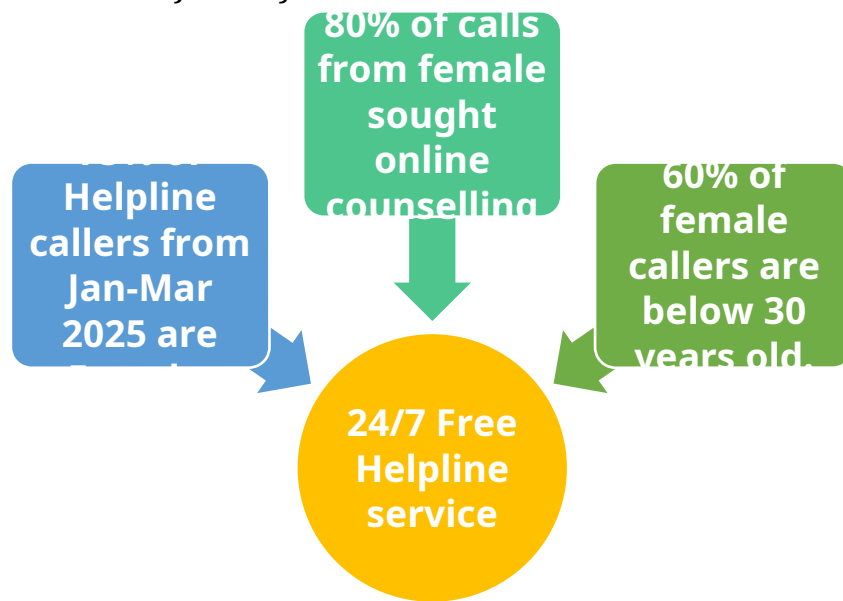
	wives and children, impact family income, and lead to conflicts, including incidents of intimate partner violence (IPV).
<p>Adultery</p> 	Women often come to the SVSG office seeking help after discovering their husbands' affairs with other women. This situation creates tension between couples, and many wives find themselves alone with children, lacking the support of their husbands, who are typically the primary earners in the family.
<p>Domestic Issues</p> 	Various domestic family issues contribute to the increasing number of cases between couples. Many conflicts arise from minor problems that should ideally be resolved internally by the parents themselves.
<p>Social Issues</p> 	There is often a reflection of immaturity among young mothers and young fathers, which can lead to family court cases. These factors highlight the complexities underlying family court cases and the importance of addressing them effectively.

Addressing social issues on a daily basis is challenging for SVSG; however, these challenges also empower and strengthen the SVSG team, enabling them to stand firm and respond effectively to their clients and victims. The staff consistently maintains a professional approach in their practice, and ensure the application of the SVSG Safeguarding process with the 'Do No Harm' approach.

SVSG 24/7 Free Helpline Service:

The SVSG Free Helpline service operates 24 hours a day and is managed by the SVSG Case Management team. Thanks to strong partnerships between SVSG and the telecommunication companies Digicel Samoa and Vodafone Samoa, this service effectively supports the remote population in need.

The following is a summary and analysis of the Helpline calls received and supported by SVSG from January to March.



The above figure highlights the key statistics of the SVSG Free Helpline for the three months from January to March 2025. It indicates that female callers made up 75% of the total, with the 60% being under 30 years old. These women reached out for support through SVSG's online counselling to seek reassurance regarding their domestic issues, particularly concerning their relationships with their husbands and family members.

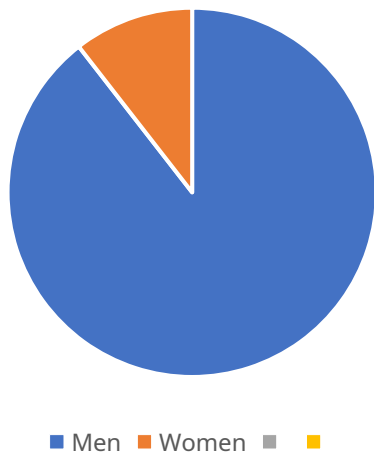
A common concern expressed by these callers was their struggle to care for their young children and their need for assistance in raising them. Many young mothers specifically inquired about how SVSG could help them, especially when their spouses or partners had abandoned them, leaving them without financial support for their small families.

This situation highlights the stress and trauma experienced by young mothers as they transition into motherhood, particularly when their families and spouses are not very supportive. The SVSG has responded by providing online counselling and through these conversations, some women have been able to regain their sense of self. Young mothers often need assistance in reconnecting with their surroundings and realizing that support is available to them at home.

SVSG Court Support and Advocacy for Men & Women.

From January to March 2025, the

SVSG advocacy programs were attended by both men and women. The data indicates that over 60% of the participants in these programs were men, while the percentage of women participants was significantly lower.

The SVSG advocacy program is designed to provide support and rehabilitation for individuals referred by the court, particularly first-time offenders. Every month, both men and women are referred to the program.

Our female counsellors facilitate the women's advocacy group, while male facilitators, including Pastor Sua Moananu of the Methodist Church, lead the men's group. The aim of these programs is to empower participants for positive reintegration into their communities and families.

SVSG Counselling Service: *SVSG counselling is an ongoing service not only within the Campus of Hope for the children and the new comers to the shelter, but also, the victims from cases and referrals from the court. SVSG Counselling and medical centre is operated in the Campus of Hope and it is headed by Afioga, Sister Jacinta. Fidow and her Psychosocial team.*

January Highlights!

January began with generous visits from local and international partners who supported SVSG through their in-kind and financial donations. SVSG is grateful

for these supportive communities, which inspire our work in saving lives and aiding the most vulnerable individuals in Samoa.



On January 6, 2025, Ministry of Savali a Keriso from Hossanna Christian Church in Brisbane made their first visit to the Campus of Hope. They generously donated in-kind items and a contribution of 2,000 tala for the children. It was a memorable day filled with laughter and smiles as the children interacted with the visitors, dancing and sharing encouraging words from the Bible. Siliniu, Lina, and Chang expressed their gratitude to this wonderful community of angels for their kind support of the children, who are in great need of assistance.

SVSG Welfare in January

SVSG Welfare is a community service initiative aimed at supporting the most vulnerable families living in poor conditions. Families are identified by the SVSG Sui Auai (village representatives) based on the number of dependents, the families with disabled family members, and elderly members with little to no income to support their daily living. SVSG Welfare is a youth-led initiative that also helps develop the capacity of SVSG Youth members by engaging them in humanitarian work, such as supporting these community members.



SVSG Youth First Meeting of 2025:

The SVSG Youth Executive Committee held its first meeting of 2025 on January 16th to plan youth projects for the year. SVSG Youth is a branch of the organization dedicated to supporting the implementation of SVSG initiatives aimed at young people and youth groups at the community level. Composed of youth volunteers, the committee gathered after their work commitments to discuss their SVSG Youth-led activities and develop project execution plans to share with the SVSG Youth in Savaii Island.



SVSG Young Human Rights Advocate.



Seventeen-year-old Gloria Talopa'u, a young female human rights activist from Pesega College, began volunteering for SVSG in January. She joined a team of young volunteers and dedicated her time to assist with English reading lessons for children, all on a voluntary basis. *"It was truly exciting to be surrounded by the children. I didn't expect the work to be so exhilarating. It has been an eye-opening experience for me. I believe more people should join and support these children who need it the most,"* Gloria expressed.

SVSG Sui Auai (Village Representatives) Convened for 2025 Planning.

The SVSG Sui Auai held its first meeting of the year in January to discuss the planned activities for the organization's 20th Anniversary celebration and upcoming projects for 2025. Prior to this general meeting, the Sui Auai Executive Committee convened to establish resolutions that would be communicated to the community for implementation.

The role of Sui Auai within SVSG is crucial. This voluntary service provided by the village representatives has been influential for the past two decades since SVSG was founded in 2005. The Sui Auai members are vital informants on child abuse cases at the community level; they serve as the eyes and ears of SVSG in the villages. They act as mediators and focal points of contact for the most vulnerable individuals, particularly children and women in village communities.



The generosity of SVSG's partners continued, and January 21 was a blessed day for SVSG when Sūla's Bakery made a generous donation of 5,000 SAT. The President of SVSG received this contribution with heartfelt gratitude, appreciating the bakery's support and love for SVSG. This donation will help SVSG provide essential care and support for the children and women at the SVSG Shelter, including daily meals, necessities, health checks, as well as covering the wages of the dedicated matrons and security guards.



EFKS donated to SVSG in January 2025.

EFKS Tanoa Le I'a and Te Atatu, both part of the jointly visited the children at the Campus of Hope. To support the children, Rev. Elder Enefatu Lesa, his wife Seira, Rev. LDS Church Members Graced SVSG with their Visit in January.

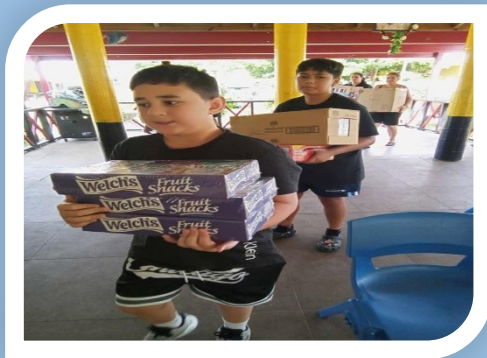

saving lives over the years. They have responded efficiently to instances of abuse and violence against children and vulnerable groups in their communities. The workshops provided by Tautua have improved their capacity to continue their voluntary work, ensuring a safer Samoan society through their roles within SVSG.

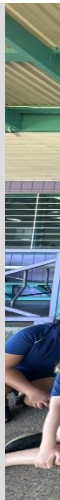
food, snacks, and drinks, making the day truly memorable for the children.

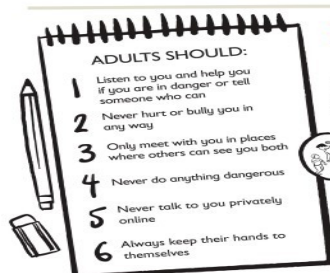
